Baltimore Community Kollel Prepares For Twelfth Successful Year

It's a place where young boys can find a chavrusa to help them with their homework; where retirees can go to learn at any time of the day; where anyone can find a minyan, a coffee, a Danish, and a sympathetic person's listening ear. It's a place filled with the kol Torah day and night. It's the Baltimore Community Kollel.

The Baltimore Community Kollel was founded eleven years ago by Rabbi Mordechai Bamberger. "I saw frum kids, 13 and 14 years old, who were going off the derech," explains Rabbi Bamberger. "I believed that these kids were just frustrated in school and looking for different avenues for satisfaction in their lives. I felt that if I could make them feel successful, there would be a better outcome. So I created the kollel, a place where these kids could go not only to find a chavrusa who could help them succeed in school, but to feel comfortable, noticed and appreciated."

As the kollel developed, it became much more than just a place to learn and daven. It became a community resource where people at various stages of life can go and feel noticed and appreciated.

Today the Baltimore Community Kollel is under the leadership of Harav Nesanel Kostelitz, shlita, Rosh Kollel, the Rav of Congregation Machzikei Torah. It comprises seven yungeleit who learn morning and afternoon seder together, and with children and baalei batim in the evenings.

There is always something going on at the kollel, beginning with Shacharis at 6:50 or 7:00, followed by learning and shiurim through the day. A shiur on parashas hashavua for retirees, a midday Daf Yomi shiur given by Harav Kostelitz, a tefillah shiur on Sunday evenings given by Rabbi Yerachmiel Goldman, a night

chaburah attended by former kollel yungeleit, and a chaburah that learns hilchos bein adam l'chavero with Rabbi Mordechai Weiskopf on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, are just a few of the learning opportunities at the kollel.

Many school-age children come to the kollel every evening, where yungeleit and baalei batim help them with their homework or learn the subject of their choice with them, helping them feel a stronger

connection to Yiddishkeit. This is all done free of charge.

Harav Kostelitz is present most of the day and evening to answer she'eilos, learn with baalei batim, and connect with anyone who comes in.

For the new Elul zman, the kollel welcomes two new yungeleit, Rabbi Zechariah Tokar and Rabbi Yehuda Finkel. Rabbi Tokar and Rabbi Finkel will be leading various evening chaburos, including a chaburah for former kollel yungeleit who are

now working, with whom they will learn halachah b'iyun on an advanced level.

In addition, beginning this Elul, Harav Laib Taub, shlita, formerly a maggid shiur at the Yeshiva of Philadelphia, will be leading a chaburah of retirees who are talmidei chachamim, learning on a high level.

In any given week, a few hundred people come to the kollel; the Rosh Kollel, the yungeleit, and Rabbi Bamberger make it a point to notice them and attend to them. Not only do they try to help them find a chavrusa, but they connect with them personally, find out about their situation, and see what can be done to help where necessary.

In fact, the kollel has provided job placement services, shadchanus, general counseling and mentoring, and much more.

As Rabbi Shmuel Friedman. one of the yungeleit, explained, "The *kollel* is a central place where anyone can come anytime. Sure, people can go to any shul and learn; but at the kollel they feel a connection. For ourselves, the kollel yungeleit, we see how our learning is mashpia on the tzibbur. In addition, Harav Kostelitz is a big asset to

the kollel, providing wonderful shimmush in many aspects of rabbanus."

Many people help make the kollel what it is. Rabbi Moshe Shuchman runs the Shabbos minyanim. Rabbi Rafael Cohen and Rabbi Yudi Brody serve as roshei chaburah. Rabbi Shmuel Friedman helps encourage teenagers to come and learn. And there are many more.

"The kollel is a genuine makom Torah. Davening at our minyanim is serious, not rushed," emphasizes Rabbi Bamberger. "Nevertheless, we also strive to make it a warm place, a place where we care about people and take an interest in their welfare. We serve cake and coffee all the time, and sometimes cholent. We try to make people feel at home, feel that someone cares about them. This was the dimension that was missing, and this is what I wanted to create when I started the kollel. We are always trying to make it better, but baruch Hashem we have accomplished a lot for the Baltimore community.'
